


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BACKWATER VALVES CAN PREVENT SEWER BACKUPS



A backwater valve prevents sewer backups from occurring on your property

Sewer backups are not only unpleasant, but can result in costly damages. A backwater valve may prevent a sewer backup from occurring on your property. If your property has drainage fixtures located below the elevation of the next upstream manhole, you might be required by the California Plumbing Code to install and maintain an approved backwater valve.

THIS OCTOBER CELEBRATE 100 YEARS OF FIRE PREVENTION

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th, in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire. The devastating inferno began on October 8, 1871 and killed more than 250 people.

The National Fire Protection Association is celebrating the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week. This year's campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape," works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires. The Santa Barbara City Fire Department will be conducting several fire safety events throughout this week, partnering with our local schools and the City Housing Authority to raise awareness.

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Provention We

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

All activities are free and open to the public and the day culminates with a fireworks show.

A SAFE HALLOWEEN IS A HAPPY HALLOWEEN

Fall is here and you and your family may be looking forward to scheduling visits to the pumpkin patch or enjoying autumnal festivals and Halloween parties. To keep you and all the pumpkins in your patch safe, City Fire has a few recommendations.



Keep it spooky but stay visible: On average, children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a car and killed on Halloween than on any other day of the year. Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors. Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers. Avoid masks that obscure vision or costumes that could contribute to trips and falls.

Before you eat, inspect the treat: Children shouldn't snack on treats from their goody bags while they're out trick-or-treating. Give them a light meal or snack before they head out – so they're not trick-or-treating on an empty stomach. Urge them to wait until they get home and let you inspect their loot before they eat any of it. Tell children not to accept – and especially not to eat – anything that isn't commercially wrapped. Inspect commercially wrapped treats for signs of tampering, such as an unusual appearance or discoloration, tiny pinholes, or tears in wrappers. Throw away anything that looks suspicious. If your child has a food allergy, check the label to ensure the allergen isn't present.

Pawanormal Cativity: Before the trick-or-treating starts, put your pets in a quiet room where they will be safe from all the Halloween activity. Pre-Halloween and during trick-or-treating, keep candy safely stashed in a high cabinet secured with a lock or child-safety latch. Many foods, such as chocolate, gum and xylitol (a sweetener used in many foods) are hazardous to pets. Bring your pets indoors before night falls. Cats are always safest inside with you, but on Halloween it's especially important to secure all pets inside so they don't run away out of fear of adults and children in costumes.
