## What is a historic context statement?

The Santa Barbara African American / Black Historic Context Statement will:

- Summarize or synthesis the community's history, specifically related to its physical development
- Identifies significant themes, patterns, trends, and property types
- Provides framework for identification, evaluation, and treatment of historic resources
- <u>Not</u> intended to be a comprehensive community history or chronology

### Why do we need context statements?

- To better understand historic resources, even in the absence of comprehensive knowledge about specific buildings
- To establish historic and cultural preservation goals & strategies
- To support and update the City's inventory of historic properties
- To provide the basis for future preservation planning decisions & programs
- To inform other aspects of larger planning processes

#### Writing Phase

- Historical overview by time period / milestones
- Identify significant themes, patterns, trends, events, places, and people
- Identify property types and requirements for historic designation in relation to historic themes
- Recommendations and priorities
