




Banales Stipulated Judgment

Pursuant to the Banales Stipulated Judgment:


"the intent of the Parties is the electoral district map shall include two electoral districts in which Latino eligible voters constitute a majority of the eligible voters according to the most recently available relevant estimates from the Census Bureau's American Community Survey, tailored to the greatest extent possible in a manner consistent with the federal and state law, so as to address any issue of vote dilution."


NDC Draft Plan 101RE

- District 1 maintains a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 is mostly confined to the Mesa, but also includes the City College, Harbor, and Stearns Wharf
- District 3 stretches from La Cumbre JHS to West Beach, and includes Downtown south of Ortega and west of State
- District 4 is limited to the foothills but has a small coastal presence
- District 5 is focused on Upper State but goes down to Hendry's Beach
- District 6 takes up most of Downtown but also
 Laguna and Oak Park




NDC Draft Plan 102RE

- District 1 now lacks a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 lacks a presence in the Westside but rather includes the whole waterfront area
- District 3 is entirely limited to the Westside and Lower West, and does not cross the freeway at all
- District 4 is limited to the foothills and has no coastal presence
- District 5 is focused on Upper State but goes down to Hendry's Beach
- District 6 takes up all of Downtown and Oak
 Park and part of Laguna




NDC Draft Plan 103RE

- District 1 now lacks a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 lacks a presence in the Westside but rather includes all of the western hilly areas
- District 3 is entirely limited to the Westside and Lower West, and does not cross the freeway at all
- District 4 covers most of the foothills but not all, rather taking in the area north of Mission Street
- District 5 is focused on Upper State and covers part of the foothills
- District 6 takes up all of Downtown and also all of the waterfront area




NDC Draft Plan 104E

- District 1 now lacks a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 is largely confined to the Mesa, but also includes most of the waterfront area
- District 3 stretches from La Cumbre JHS to West Beach, and includes part of Downtown also
- District 4 is limited to the foothills but has a small coastal presence
- District 5 is focused on Upper State but goes down to Hendry's Beach
- District 6 takes up most of Downtown but also Laguna and Oak Park, plus the area between Modoc and the freeway





- District 6 takes up most of Downtown, all of Oak Park, and parts of Upper East and Westside





- District 6 takes up most of Downtown, all of Oak Park, and much of the Westside, going well past Modoc




DEC Plan E

- District 6 takes up most of Downtown, all of Oak Park, and parts of Upper East and Westside




DEC Plan EU

- District 1 now lacks a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 is mostly confined to the Mesa, but also includes the whole West Beach area
- District 3 forms an "L" shape, with Mission and Castillo Street as the primary boundaries
- District 4 covers the foothills and East Beach
- District 5 is focused on Upper State but goes down to Hendry's Beach
- District 6 takes up most of Downtown, all of Oak Park, and much of the Westside, going well past Modoc



NDC Plan Blend

- District 1 now lacks a presence on State Street and East Beach
- District 2 is limited to the Mesa, but also includes Campanil
- District 3 stretches from La Cumbre JHS to West Beach, and "hooks" into lower Downtown
- District 4 covers most of the foothills but not all, rather taking in the waterfront area
- District 5 is focused on Upper State and covers part of the foothills
- District 6 takes up most of Downtown but also Laguna and Oak Park
